

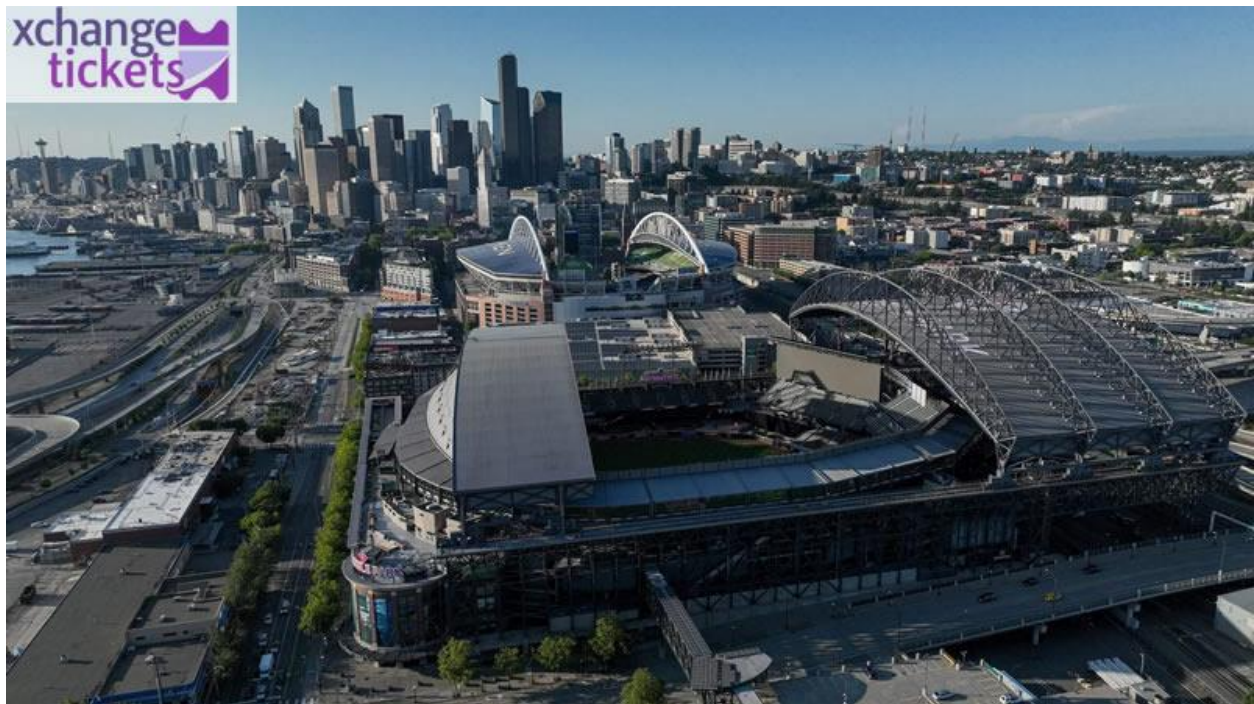

Concerns are mounting around the commercialization of the FIFA World Cup 2026, as critics warn that rising ticket prices driven by dynamic pricing models risk transforming football’s most inclusive global event into an exclusive spectacle accessible only to the wealthy, a shift that former Liverpool FC chief executive Peter Moore has described.

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In stark terms, as dystopian. Speaking from his home in California, Moore argued that while dynamic pricing may function in industries like live music, where fans can wait until the last minute to purchase tickets. The same model is fundamentally incompatible with a global tournament like the World Cup.

Where supporters must plan international travel months or even years in advance. The FIFA World Cup 2026 edition, set to be hosted by the United States, Canada, and Mexico, is expected to be the largest in the competition's history. Yet, its scale is being overshadowed by concerns.

That ordinary fans are being priced out, with reports of ticket packages reaching staggering figures and resale markets inflating costs even further. Moore has been particularly critical of Gianni Infantino, accusing the head of FIFA of misjudging the reaction of global supporters and allowing a system to develop.

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According to Moore, the integration of dynamic pricing combined with the legality of ticket resales in the United States has opened the door for bots and speculators to dominate the market, purchasing large quantities of tickets not to attend matches but to resell them at inflated prices.

In the weeks leading up to games, thereby distorting availability and undermining fairness. He warned that this shift could fundamentally alter the demographic makeup of World Cup audiences, replacing the diverse, passionate supporters who traditionally define the tournament with a more corporate one.

An affluent crowd, potentially eroding the authentic atmosphere that has long been central to football's global appeal. The issue is compounded by additional barriers facing international fans, including visa uncertainties and travel costs, with some supporters from participating nations encountering restrictions.



That makes attendance even more difficult, raising broader questions about accessibility and inclusivity at what is meant to be the world's game. Moore questioned the ethics of maximizing revenue at the expense of fan participation, noting that FIFA has projected billions in earnings from ticketing.
